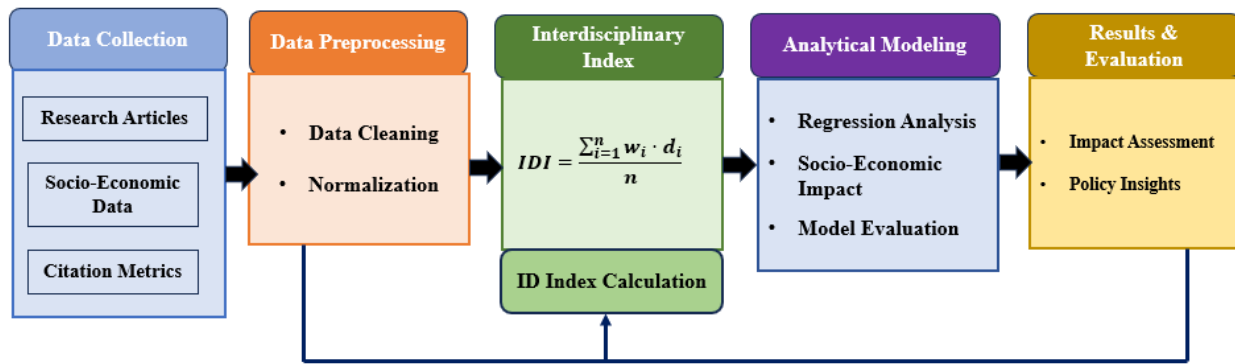


Fig. 1. Conceptual framework of interdisciplinary research methodology

Fig. 1 demonstrates the concept scheme of the suggested approach involving data collection, data preprocessing, calculation of interdisciplinary index, and analytical modeling.

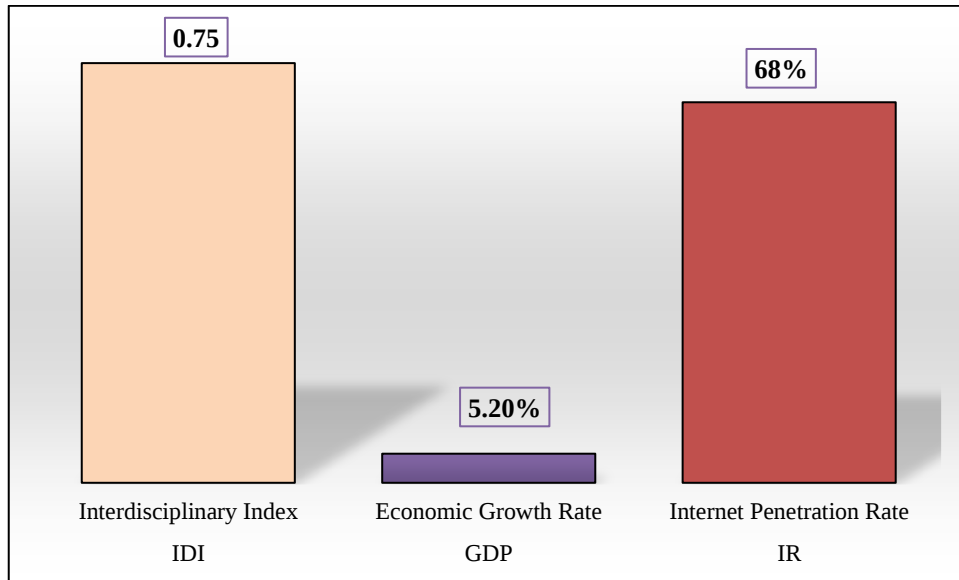


Fig. 2. Comparative Representation of Interdisciplinary Index and Socio-Economic Indicators
